A few things about happenings with the National Storytelling Network (NSN). Please remember that Territory Tellers belongs as an organization, plus we have TT members who are also NSN members. Check out the new website, it's clean and easier to navigate.

Last summer when the NSN conference in Georgia was cancelled due to Covid the future of this premiere storytelling organization looked a little uncertain, even a little bleek. Then the virtual conference zoomed around the world over 8 days with over 600 stories from places many of us can only dream of seeing. We heard tellers from all sorts of places and discovered a commonality, people are quite similar everywhere. NSN has had to make some changes, but the potential now is for a new revitalized organization. They are still searching to get it right but it sure is looking good.

I would encourage you to consider joining NSN. It would help keep this major organization supporting storytelling on an international level continue to grow, and bring its members along for the ride. More importantly, it is another way for all of us to experience personal growth in our telling, as well as it is just fun to hear great tellers from all over. 

At the top are several topic headings, including Events. Here you can check a calendar of events around the country, or schedule your own. For example we can schedule our November 22nd Tellabration, future retreats and festivals. The Tellabration page also gives suggestions for Tellabration planning and the few requirements for hosting a Tellabration.
