# OK book added to library in Iceland

The country of Iceland is known for its high literacy rate. It is a country that loves poetry and stories, both written and oral. Now it can add one more book about stories and storytellers. When Chester Weems recently traveled to Iceland he took a new copy of Marilyn Hudson's book Stories Center Stage: Storytelling in Modern Oklahoma. Chester went to the public library in Akureyri, the second largest city, of about 20,000, in northern Iceland. They have a very modern library, the newest in Iceland. Chester presented Marilyn's book to Doddi Jonsson, a staff member and an Icelandic author himself, to be added to the library's collection. Donna Le recently presented "Prairie Moon" sto-




ries at St. Ann Retirement Center in Oklahoma City. Le made contact with the activities director while attending a conference and took the
